## Crime Unit

### Supervisor: Detective Sergeant Byron SCHWASS

The Grey Bruce County Crime Unit (7 Detectives) led, assisted or managed 22 Benchmark Occurrences from May 1<sup>st</sup> to May 31<sup>st</sup>, 2022 and 23 Benchmark Occurrences June 1<sup>st</sup>, to June 30<sup>th</sup>, 2022.

May included 9 Sudden Death investigations (one of which was a suspected opiate overdose), as well as a two Criminal Harassments, two Indecent Act investigations, and six reported Sexual Assaults.

June included 12 Sudden Death investigations (one of which was a six-month old infant SIDS death), as well as a two Criminal Harassments, two Fraud Investigations, and three reported Sexual Assaults.

This Unit is also assisting other Major Crime Units with investigations/ statements and providing guidance to uniform personnel on criminal investigations. Two DCs are actively engaged on the completion of the CHISAR homicide in Hamilton. Two DCs are actively engaged in court prep on the SPRUNG homicide, with pre-trial motions in August.

The Grey Bruce Major Crime Unit continues to follow up leads, prepare for court, and investigate several ongoing Homicides which fall under the direction of OPP Criminal Investigations Branch (CIB).

- SPRUNG Homicide (Meaford) completed the preliminary inquiry for 1<sup>st</sup> degree Murder and is now proceeding to trial.
- SOLOMON Homicide (Saugeen First Nation) trial pending.
- The JACKSON attempt murder (North Bruce Peninsula), and the CHISAR homicide (male arrested for 2<sup>nd</sup> degree Murder) both are still under investigation.

All National and Ontario Sex Offenders, Hate Crime / Extremism Investigations and High Risk to re-offend Offenders and High Risk Domestic Violence Offenders continue to be managed by the Grey Bruce County Crime Unit.



## **Community Street Crime Unit**

### **Supervisor: Detective Sergeant James BLAIR**

Acting Detective Sergeant Jeff DUDLEY from OPP Intelligence continues to lead the team as Detective Sergeant Jamie BLAIR was assigned to an investigation based on his expertise. Detective Sergeant Jamie Blair returns to the team in July 2021.

In May, CSCU were conducting observations of a motel and observed a wanted party attending one of the units. The male left the Hotel a short time later and was arrested for the outstanding warrants. A search of the suspect during the arrest, revealed fentanyl and methamphetamine. The male was charged for possession for the purpose of trafficking fentanyl and possession of methamphetamine.

CSCU executed a search warrant at an address in relation to an ongoing drug trafficking investigation. Police arrested and charged two people under the Controlled Drugs and Substance Act and the Cannabis Act. Police seized cannabis marihuana, cocaine, crack cocaine, methamphetamine, and drug trafficking paraphernalia. Total value of the seized drugs is estimated to be \$29,662.00.

Police executed a search warrant at a property in relation to a property crime investigation. Grey Bruce CSCU and Huron Perth CSCU worked collaboratively to target a group of individuals responsible for many property crimes in the area. Police recovered three stolen snow machines, two classic cars, four stolen trailers and a stolen pickup truck. Total value of the recovered property is \$179,500.00.

CSCU executed a search for a stolen generator advertised on social media. Police attended the address and arrested two males away from the location in possession of the stolen generator. The value of the recovered stolen generator is estimated to be \$800.

In June, CSCU Located stolen pickup truck just over an hour after it was reported stolen. IDed driver, R&PG for his arrest, warrant to be sought if not located. Assisted by DC Dlouhy, truck recovered and returned to owner after being forensically examined. Total value of the stolen pick up is \$5,000.00

A trailer carrying a John Deere side by side was stolen over night. CSCU located and returned the stolen trailer to the rightful owner. During the investigation CSCU determined it was related to a family dispute and no charges were laid. The total value of the stolen trailer and John Deer ATV is \$30,000.00

Police executed a search warrant at a in relation to a property crime investigation. Grey Bruce CSCU and Huron Perth CSCU worked collaboratively to target a group of individuals responsible for a large number of property crimes in the area. Police recovered 7 stolen vehicles, 2 stolen ATV's 3 stolen trailers, ammunition, and methamphetamine. Total value of the recovered property is \$211,235.00. Total value of the seized drugs is \$25,500.00.



Grey Bruce CSCU continues to prioritize local crime trends, the opioid crises and targeting local people identified in property thefts. CSCU members are committed to continuous learning and are attending training when time permits. CSCU has developed local training initiatives for front line members to promote officer safety and enhance their local knowledge on the current drug and property crimes trends in the area.



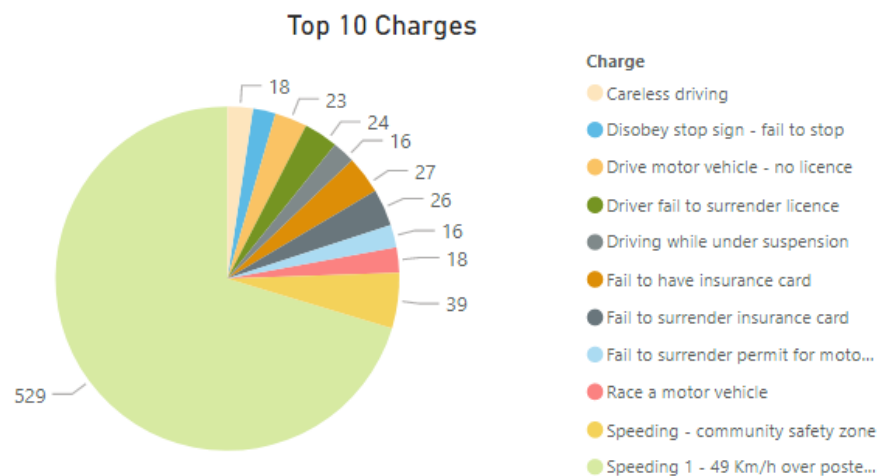

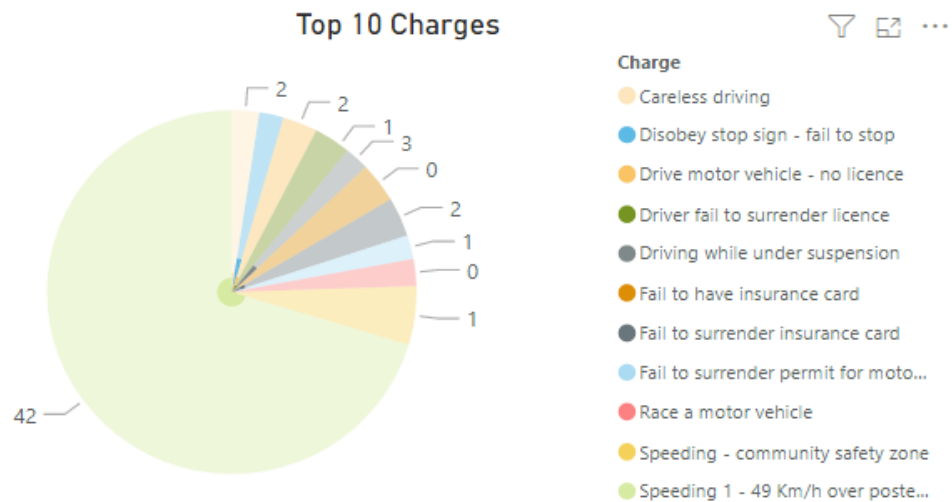

**RE: SUPPORT FOR REQUESTS BY TORONTO POLICE SERVICES BOARD RELATED TO FEDERAL BAIL REFORM**

**“The need for evidence-based bail reform”**

Please accept this letter as formal endorsement by the Ontario Association of Police Services Boards, for the legislative proposals for bail reform advanced to you by the Toronto Police Services Board on May 25, 2022.

The requested legislative changes communicated to you by Toronto Police Services Board Chair Jim Hart and Executive Director Ryan Teschner are both thoughtful and measured. The comprehensive report provided to them by Chief of Police, James Ramer, outlined the significant collaborative initiatives within the city designed to prevent gun violence through proactive interventions and improved investigative outcomes. It also acknowledged the small portion of the population where proactive and early intervention strategies have proven to be unsuccessful in deterring their engagement in violent gun crimes. It is in response to this high-risk segment of the population that the Toronto Police Services Board seeks changes to federal legislation that would;

- Require that Bail Hearings for the most serious firearm offences be heard by a judge of the Ontario Court or Superior Court, clearly conveying Parliament’s view of the seriousness of these offences (and their impact on the public) as well as reflecting the views and concerns of the public about these incidents
- Add an additional route to First Degree Murder under Section 231 of the *Criminal Code*, by including death resulting from the discharge of a firearm in a congregate setting; this would act as a strong deterrent, clearly express society’s disapprobation of such conduct and help

- maintain public confidence in the justice system; and
- Increase parole ineligibility to 2/3 of an individual's custodial sentence, for any offence where the court finds that the offender discharged a firearm in a congregate setting (including those who are found to be parties to such offences).

We recognize that the complexities of the issues impacting community safety and wellbeing require a collaborative multi-sector commitment to be successful. This is no exception. Emergency services, community services, health services, local councils, provincial governments and the federal government need to recognize the crucial role each plays in the collective effort to make each of our communities safe.

Toronto Police Services Board is asking for this reform, because the tools currently available to the police and their partner agencies have been in-effective at preventing tragic events within the city. We applaud the Toronto Police Services Board and the Toronto Police Service for their leadership on this issue. This issue is not isolated to the City of Toronto, it impacts all communities.

As the leading voice for police governance in Ontario, we encourage you to prioritize the Toronto Police Services Boards proposed legislated changes related to Federal Bail Reform.
